Initiated by our Agriculture Leaders, and supported by their mentor and passionate Kitchen Garden Club facilitator, Lucy Cameron, we are hoping this stall will be a regular 'pop-up' after Assembly on a Friday. Our students, and many of our staff, have enjoyed spending time in the Garden. It was truly wonderful to see the product and results of everybody's hard work.

The success of the garden and the produce yielded have involved many hands of our community - multiple students, parent volunteers, staff and Student Leaders. In addition to our Agriculture Leaders, our Environment Leaders also play a significant role in the garden by tending to our composting. This got me thinking a bit more about compost...

Compost

The humble compost, while not glamorous, and full of our garbage, plays a critical role in the success of our garden. The Environment Leaders collect all our scraps and snack-time disguards and give them over to the compost. With some time and some turning over, the compost yields wonderfully dark and rich soil that we can then spread in the garden. Our rubbish, given over to the compost, emerges transformed into something that helps our garden to thrive.

Toxic Achievement Culture

Toxic achievement culture is characterised by the entanglement of self-worth, achievement and the relentless pursuit of academic or extracurricular success - at any cost! This phenomenon goes beyond the mere quest for success. it embeds a belief in students that their merit is exclusively tied to their achievements, often propelled by intense external pressures from families, schools, and society.

Some students are overfilling their schedules with activities aimed at "getting ahead". However, the consequences are proving to be detrimental on students' mental and physical health resulting in burnout and heightened levels of stress. This culture is also being aggravated by parental expectations, peer competition and a relentless comparison ethos often driven by social media.

There is nothing wrong with having ambition, but it's crucial to ensure that this desire doesn't push our young people into a toxic cycle of achievement and make them feel that they must achieve in order to matter. The relentless drive to excel is leading many students to prioritise accolades over genuine learning and personal growth, often at the expense of their own wellbeing and interpersonal relationships. As adult carers, we need to advocate for a more balanced and holistic approach to achievement, emphasising the importance of resilience, wellbeing, and the pursuit of diverse interests. 

Camps Sports and Excursion Funding (CSEF) - Applications are now open

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund provides payments for eligible students to attend activities like school camps, trips, school organized sports programs, outdoor education programs, excursions, and incursions. Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. A Special Consideration category also exists. Payments are \$150 per eligible primary student. Students starting Foundation who are eligible for CSEF may also receive assistance toward the cost of school uniforms. Celebrating Student Birthdays



Birthdays are a wonderful opportunity to celebrate the uniqueness of every child in our community. In each class at TLS, teachers and students acknowledge each student's birthday in their own fashion.

To ensure the safety and wellbeing of each child in our community, we ask parents not to send cake, food, lollies and/or gift bags to school. This policy has been adopted by Early Childhood services and many Primary Schools for the following reasons:

- To ensure student safety many students have food-based allergies and could have a serious reaction should they ingest foods containing allergens
- To reduce the financial/ and or time pressure on families to provide food and gifts for large numbers of students
- To remove the negative impact on student wellbeing when some students feel their birthday celebration is 'not as good' as other students
- To ensure parents have control over what their children eat and their wishes are respected if they do not want their children to be eating high sugar/calorie foods
